

Confessions of a hopeless umbraphile

Before you spend any more of your valuable time reading this article, you need to know that it has nothing to do with classic cars, Buicks or otherwise. It is reasonable for you to expect an article about classic cars; after all, this is a newsletter for a classic car club. But alas, my love of older cars is only part of my life (albeit a very large one).....I also love baseball and astronomy. This article is about the latter...so be forewarned.

It would also be reasonable if you asked...."Just what in the world is an umbraphile, anyway"? Well...umbra means a shadow...simple as that. In this context we are talking about the shadow of the moon as it crosses the earth during a total solar eclipse. We umbraphiles love this shadow. I heard the term originally from an astronomer on one of my earlier eclipse treks, and I liked the sound of it.


And that is why Michelle and I ended up in Madras, Oregon over the weekend of August 18-21. The Great American Eclipse, as it has come to be known, was visible from Oregon to the Carolinas. It is the first time a total eclipse has crossed the lower 48 since 1918. Even the Red Sox didn't go that long without winning, but the Cubs did!.

Ah, Madras. This small enclave on the east side of the Cascades in the Oregon desert. Desolate, hot, windy. Not your ideal spot to spend a weekend...but...they have about 350 clear days a year there...that is why I picked it over two years ago to view this eclipse. Astronomy magazine recently vindicated my decision in naming Madras the best place in these here United States to view the eclipse. So there!

There are many, many people; scientists and non-scientists alike that believe that a total solar eclipse is the most spectacular event in nature. I am one of these people. I have chased the shadow of the moon to eight different locations (Michelle has seen four) all over the world: the Caribbean in 1998, Turkey in 2006, China in 2009, Polynesia in 2010, Australia in 2012, Svalbard (Norway) in 2015, Indonesia in 2016, and Madras. We usually do these as part of a tour so we get to see the fascinating places and people. We also keep linking up with the same people (Umbraphiles United!), many of whom we stay in contact with.

We stayed at the Jefferson County fairgrounds in Madras (rented a RV). My daughter and son-in-law from Washington and my son and granddaughter from Eureka joined us. I've heard estimates of 50,000 people descending on Madras for this event (the population of the town is only 6000). At the fairgrounds they had an event called SolarFest with bands (not very good!), booths, and NASA lectures. The city of Madras put their best face forward for this event, and I must give kudos to the organizers, volunteers, and law-enforcement for how things were handled.

I know you're just in a dither in anticipation, so let's start by telling you what an eclipse is. The moon goes between the earth and sun. The sun is 400 times farther away than the moon and is 400 times bigger so it's apparent size is just about the same as the sun. This cosmic coincidence is our lucky break....this is the only place in the solar system where this occurs. It happens about once every eighteen months somewhere in the world.....a good excuse to travel!



So, you can see from this diagram that only a small area (about 70 miles wide) sits in the path of totality. Santa Rosa, which was clouded over, got about 70% of the sun covered by the moon.

The moon first crossed the surface of the sun at about 9:08 AM on the 21st in Madras. During the 'partial phases' one must use eye protection to view the sun...you can watch totality with the naked eye.





Getting my 'geek on' as my son-in-law was fond of saying...

Okay...now the moment you have been anxiously waiting for...pictures of the eclipse:

And then, the sun is totally blacked out and <u>totality</u> begins. The star (no pun intended) of this show is the dazzling silver <u>corona</u>. This is actually the photosphere of the sun…always there, but visible only during an eclipse. The corona is what most of us think makes a total solar eclipse so awesome.





Those red spots (look closely!) at the 12:00 and 3:00 positions are solar flares



This is the famous 'diamond ring' which heralds both the beginning and end of totality. It is the suns' light going through the mountains and valleys on surface of the moon.

These photos by a novice photographer do not do this spectacle justice. I've never seen a photo that does. Maybe I've got your attention and you may want to see one? The eastern US in 2024 is the next total solar eclipse in the US. But wait! July 2019 Michelle and I will be in Chile for the next one....wanna join us?
