MY FIRST CAR

My first car was a 1947 2-door Chevy coupe that I purchased in 1957. It took many years (about three) working paper routes, mowing lawns and yes even baby sitting in order to afford the car. It had a radio, heater, 3-speed transmission (that's all they had back then) with vacuum shift. The vacuum shift was the first thing I modified. It was removed and the shifting was much improved. I also cleaned the inside and outside as if it was a show car which it wasn't but you know how it goes. It was my first car and it was all mine. My Dad was the Auto Shop Instructor at San Rafael High School so I was able to paint the car in the auto shop spray booth after many hours of sanding, removing all bright work and then of course putting it all back together again. A lot of work but I drove that car with a smile and a great deal of pride. I went to Grand Auto in San Rafael and bought some cat whiskers so I wouldn't scrape my white walls (port-a-walls) on the curbs. That car got me through high school on many double dates and a few drag races on the road to San Quintin. It was slow but all the cars back then were slow.

When I joined the Coast Guard in November of 1958, I sold the car and landed on a 311 foot cutter but I have always had a soft spot for '47 Chevy coupes. Below is a picture of a 1947 Chevy coupe but this was not my exact car – but close.



A Studebaker like few others (My First Car)

This story begins in the mid 1950s, when the house across the street from where my family lived was sold to couple in their 40s. Bob had two teenaged daughters that did not live with them. Claudia had no children and worked in corporate accounting. Both were friendly engaging folks that quickly became part of the neighborhood scene. Their car was a blue 1952 Studebaker Commander 4 door sedan.



Bob was a man of many interests. He was a Hi Fi enthusiast building from kits first monoral and later stereo equipment. He was always seeking greater performance. From time to time The Dukes of Dixieland could be heard inside the neighbor's home.

Bob's quest for better performance extended to their "Stude. The car had a V-8 with a Borg-Warner automatic that featured a locking torque converter. He had installed a dual exhaust with "glasspacks". Next were added Edmunds 2x2 manifold and a "racing" cam. A Mallory dual point distributor mated with a Mallory "Mag-Spark" coil boosted the 6 volt ignition. It would start with a muffled roar and move away from the curb with authority.

A new '57 Ford Fairlane 500 2 door hardtop was soon added. A handsome car equipped with the biggest available "Thunderbird" V-8 ,Fordomatic, power steering and brakes. From this point the Studebaker could be observed to sit idle for a week or more between uses. Before long the sitting out in the Daly City fog began to take its toll on its finish.

The Ford was traded in on a new 1960 Oldsmobile Super 88 4 door "Flat Top".

That Olds was a big upgrade over the Ford and by now the old Studebaker was known to need a battery charge between runs. Before long the car needed more than TLC. As the car sat motionless and silent I often thought that it would be really neat to own that car. It was so different from the other old cars that kids were parking in the student parking lot at school.

Sadly, in the Spring of 1963 Claudia suddenly became a widow.

At that time I was a Junior in High School. My major was in auto mechanics. Youngsters could do that then. Like most of my buddies from school I was interested in all things cars.

Before long Claudia determined that the Studebaker needed to be sold. She asked if I could get the car started for her. I quickly agreed and started work immediately. Turned out the old car had deteriorated badly. It needed tires and brakes. The radiator and water pump leaked. The carbs were gummed up. The list kept getting longer with things that needed attention.

I asked if she would sell me the car. To my delight she said she would if my father and mother agreed. As a newly licensed driver my folks were concerned that the Studebaker was perhaps not the best choice for my first car. I pleaded my case and Claudia told by dad that Van Ness Olds would have only allowed them \$85 in trade in when they bought their "88". She would ask only \$35 for the car. I would have to pay for the car and insurance with my own money that had been saved from doing odd jobs and working in a gas station on the weekends.

At long last I had my own car. I was over the moon!

That Monday I approached the Auto Shop teacher for permission to bring the car into the shop for the needed work. During the two week stay the car was made road safe and tuned to run strong. Our teacher helped with diagnosis of vacuum leaks and some of the finer points of tuning the dual carburetors, while there, the car was a constant point of interest and soon the word got around that I had this sleeper of a car.

That summer went by quickly. Almost a fast as that Studebaker, I would occasionally be challenged to a race over on Brotherhood Way. The old beast could do well up against most "stockers" that kids drove. It didn't have much of a chance if somebody was driving a later model with a larger displacement engine with a stick shift. Quick enough off the line the car would really pull strong from about 15 MPH up and through the automatic up shifts. The converter would lock up at about 65 or so. From there on up it was all about go. Bob had told me years before that it could do 100 no sweat. I took it to almost 90 a couple of times driving up to Rio Nido or back to the City.

The problem with the car was that the rest of the car couldn't keep up with the engine. The brakes and suspension were not good at high speeds. Drive faster than 75 or so and the windshield wipers would lift off the cowl, the body raddled and he car wandered all over the road. I seldom went past 65-70 and even that did not feel as controlled as it did at 55-60. Even with those shortcomings it was a blast to drive. The exhaust note and carb roar was worth it. One big down side was the appetite for gasoline. No doubt my desire to push hard on the throttle at nearly every stop light change did not help. Even by buddies would complain about the frequent "gas money" assessments I would have to make.

Fortunately, I never got a ticket in the car. I was busted none the less by reports to my parents from their friends who had observed me streaking here or there or how I had passed them at some breakneck speed. My father was particularly displeased and my mother disappointed that I had broken my promise to her to always "be careful". I was compelled to sell the car. An ad was placed in the Chronicle that generated few calls. I was almost grounded with my Dad doing odometer checks to make sure that I was only going to school during the week.

Later in the early autumn of 1963 the situation changed. As things worked out; Claudia came back into the story. She was in the process of settling Bob's estate with his daughters. One of them asked about "daddy's car" and expressed disapproval that the car had been sold. Claudia wanting to do right by her step daughter offered to buy the car back. She offered to pay me the \$35 I had paid her plus all of my out of pocket expenses to restore the car. \$300 was the agreed amount.

My father was more than pleased to see the Studebaker go away. Mother expressed great relief that her source of so much worry would soon be gone for good.

Reluctantly, I found myself with no car of my own; a condition that would not last long. As I immediately started my search for car #2.

There is a sad epilogue to this tale.

Several months later the Studebaker was in a fairly significant fender bender on 19th Ave. Hit hard in the back and pushed into the car ahead. It was totaled by the insurance company and sent off to a auto wreckers. A tragic end for such a unique vehicle. Fortunately, no one was hurt in the event. I like to think that the seat belts that were installed in my Auto Shop class contributed to that outcome.
